Albeit very well formulated and insightful, this does not address the chronic crime issue we have that according to data(CompStat, Crime Control Strategies along with the analysis from the Area) shows a pattern that has a nexus and accumulation on third watch. Not only in Vehicle Hijackings but Robberies as well.

Although I appreciate your opinion, it's not what I asked for when I requested your written report which is now three and a half hours past my requested deadline and submitted via email. We will have a face to face discussion in order to ensure that you understand my vision and strategy for the operation of third watch and the 007th District at large. Thank you.

Commander,

I would like to respectfully address the two separate elements of your email in reverse order. You state that the number of recorded Traffic Stops made (or documented) has decreased in direct correlation to the increased number of vehicular hijackings being reported. As you can see by the attached documents, the number of TSSS cards per Officer on the Third Watch has remained steady over the course of the current year. Despite the Third Watch losing 21 Officers to various units and assignments (SDSC Team, Area Central Bike Team, Tactical Team, etc.), including 13 Officers who significantly added to the amount of stops being performed, the remaining Officers on the Third Watch have continuously stepped up to maintain the high output being produced. The average daily deployment for Third Watch has dropped from approximately 66 Officers per day to around 52 or 53 Officers a day over the course of 2018 (rarely, if ever, exceeding the 15% allotment for elective time) while at the same time the average amount of TSSS cards completed per Officer per day has risen from 4.55 cards per Officer per day to 4.75 cards per Officer per day, using the first three weeks of the year versus the most current three weeks of the year. Even the running three-week-average over the last five weeks has only shown an incremental drop from 4.88 to 4.75. Additionally, there has not been a

single week in 2018 when the Third Watch has not exceeded the amount of stops performed from the previous year, usually more than doubling the previous year's totals.

In sum, despite mounting obstacles to the success of the Watch (loss of personnel, loss of the most productive personnel), the Third Watch has steadfastly maintained the highest standards of productivity. I cannot speak for the other watches, but I will proudly extol the hard work of the Officers on this watch.

To address your first issue, I will say that the sheet provided by the Area analyst is a mishmash of information. There is no pattern of activity either before, during, or after the crime that would lead anyone to believe that these are related crimes. While there are two active patterns concerning vehicular hijackings in the District (P18-2-026 and P18-2-027) the information given in them is so hopelessly vague as to be unusable. This type of crime, as is most crime, is one of opportunity. It does not appear that these are coordinated or collaborative efforts by a gang of carjackers. In fact, targeting citizens in 007 is self-defeating if these are local malefactors in that they would be easily recognizable as being from the neighborhood.

Taking all the above into account, I will continue to instruct the Officers of the Third Watch to be watchful for vehicles running unattended and urge the Officers to begin citing these citizens for creating conditions which promote this potentially violent and possibly life-threatening crime. I will also continue updating the Officers to any developments in the abovementioned crime patterns. Finally, I will instruct the Officers to be particularly observant of delivery drivers operating in the 007th District as they are the sole common factor in more than one case presented in either of the patterns or the Area's analysis.

Traffic Stops & TVB Calls for Service Citywide from 25-Jul-19 to 25-Jul-19

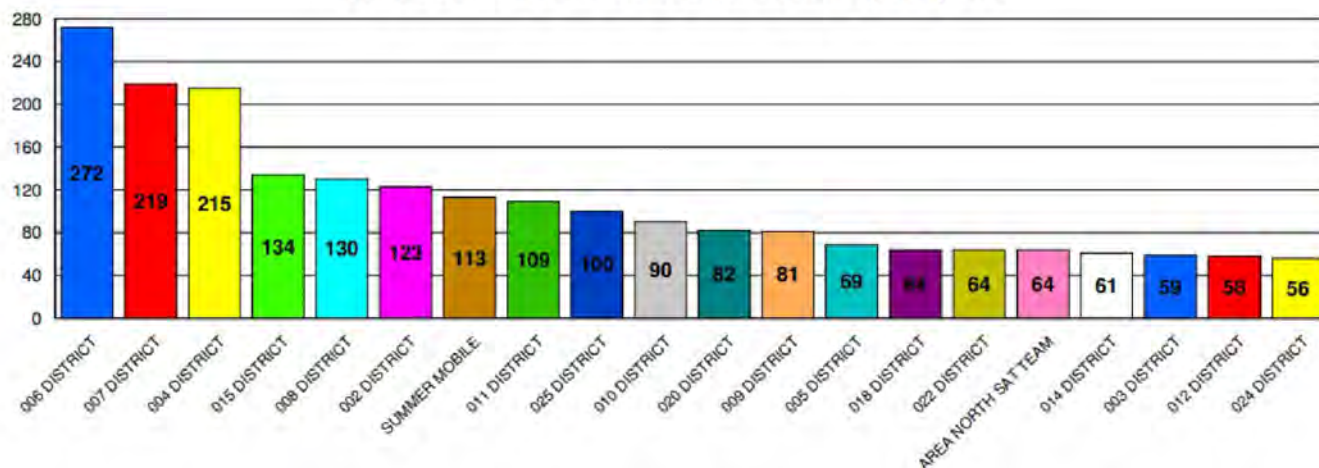

Good Evening,

Effective immediately, each watch will be responsible for traffic missions that correlate with our 003rd District violence zones (Please see attachment). These traffic missions have to be conducted every day on every watch, with a focus on probable cause traffic stops and investigations. WOL's will assign missions to every unit in the field, to be supervised by every Sergeant in the field. Please ensure during these missions that the officers go down on the air stating that they are on a traffic stop, with the location. The Sergeants will gather the information and submit to the WOL, who will compile the information in an email to the District Commander, who will send the daily report up the Area Deputy Chief's Office.

Because WOL's leave before the tour of duty has concluded, the oncoming WOL will be responsible for the data being reported to the District Commander. This report should be compiled and sent within a reasonable time after the previous watch has ended.

The focus is to fight criminal activity, especially shootings, homicides, an UUW violations by traffic stops and enforcement. This will also help and encourage officers to re-engage with active police work. This goal and mission should be talked about regularly in all roll calls, including tactical roll call.

Please ensure that officers are wearing masks, using hand sanitizer, and wearing gloves when engaging with the public,-19 precautions.

The missions and data gathering process will continue until further notice. WOL's, Field Lieutenant's, Tactical Lieutenant, and all Sergeants will be held accountable for this task to be successful!

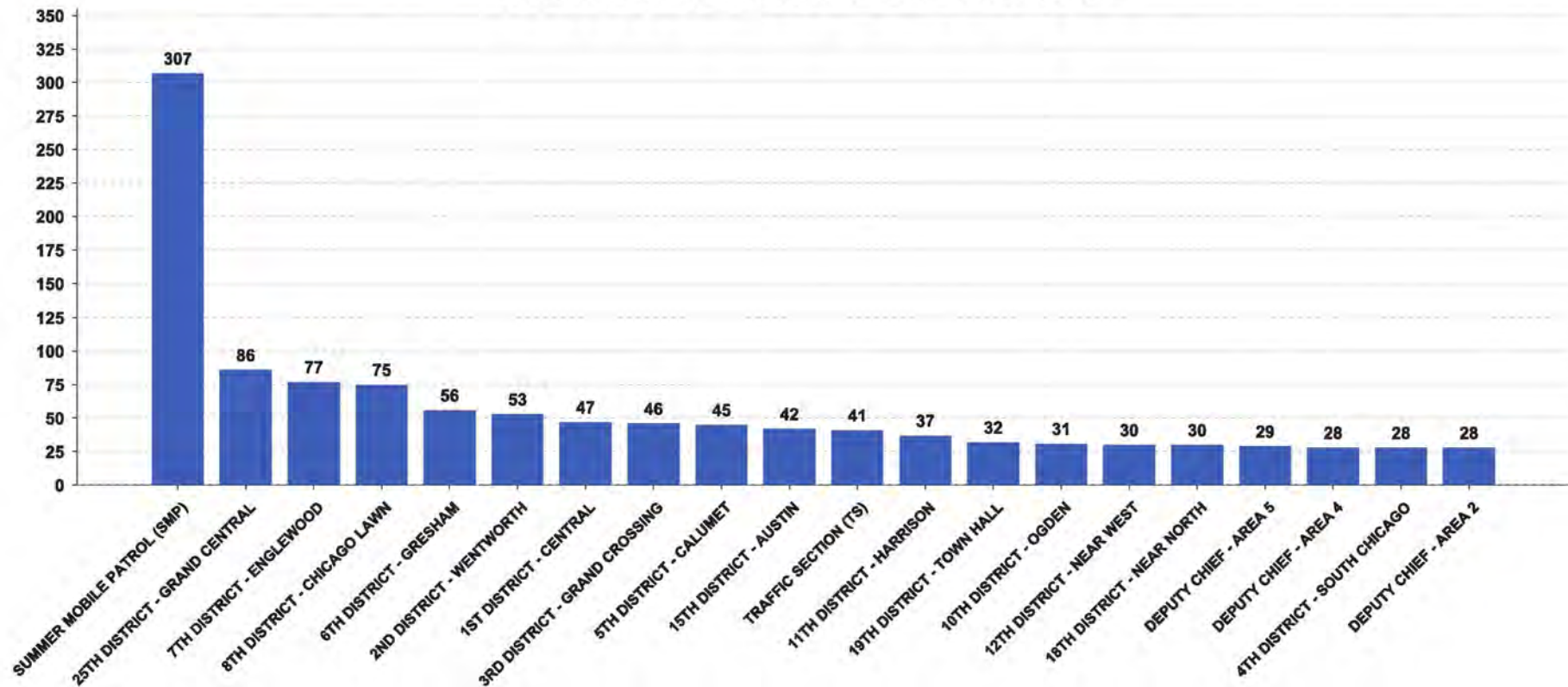

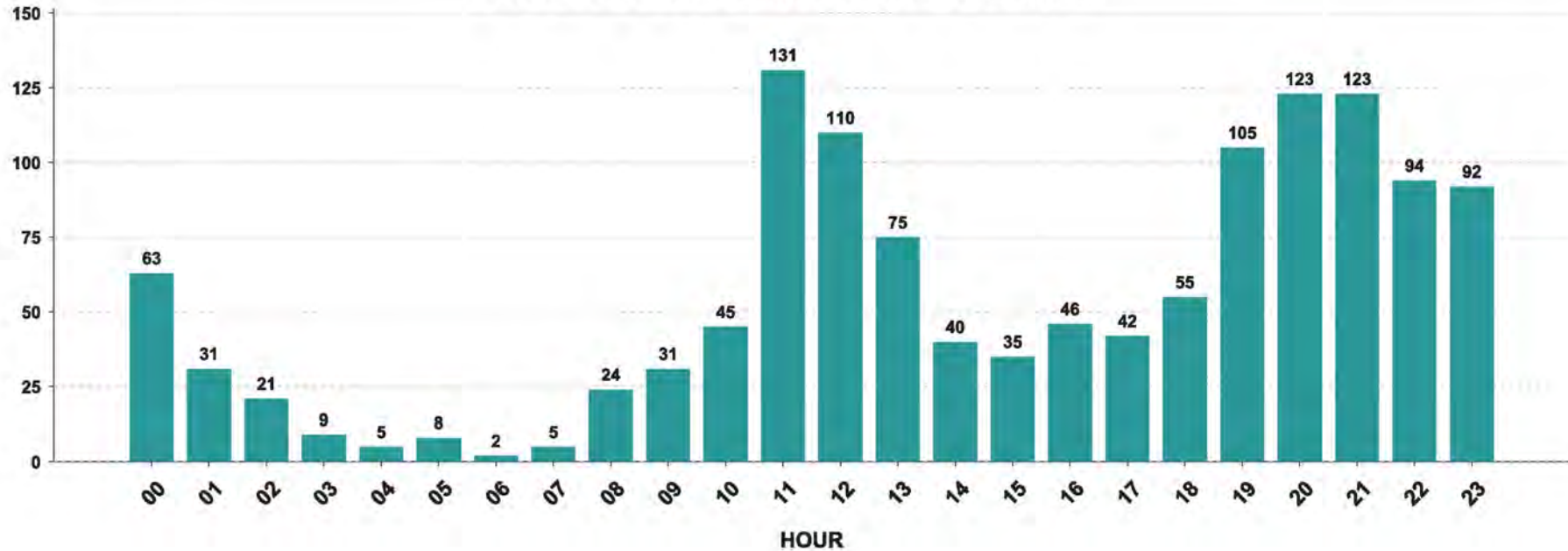

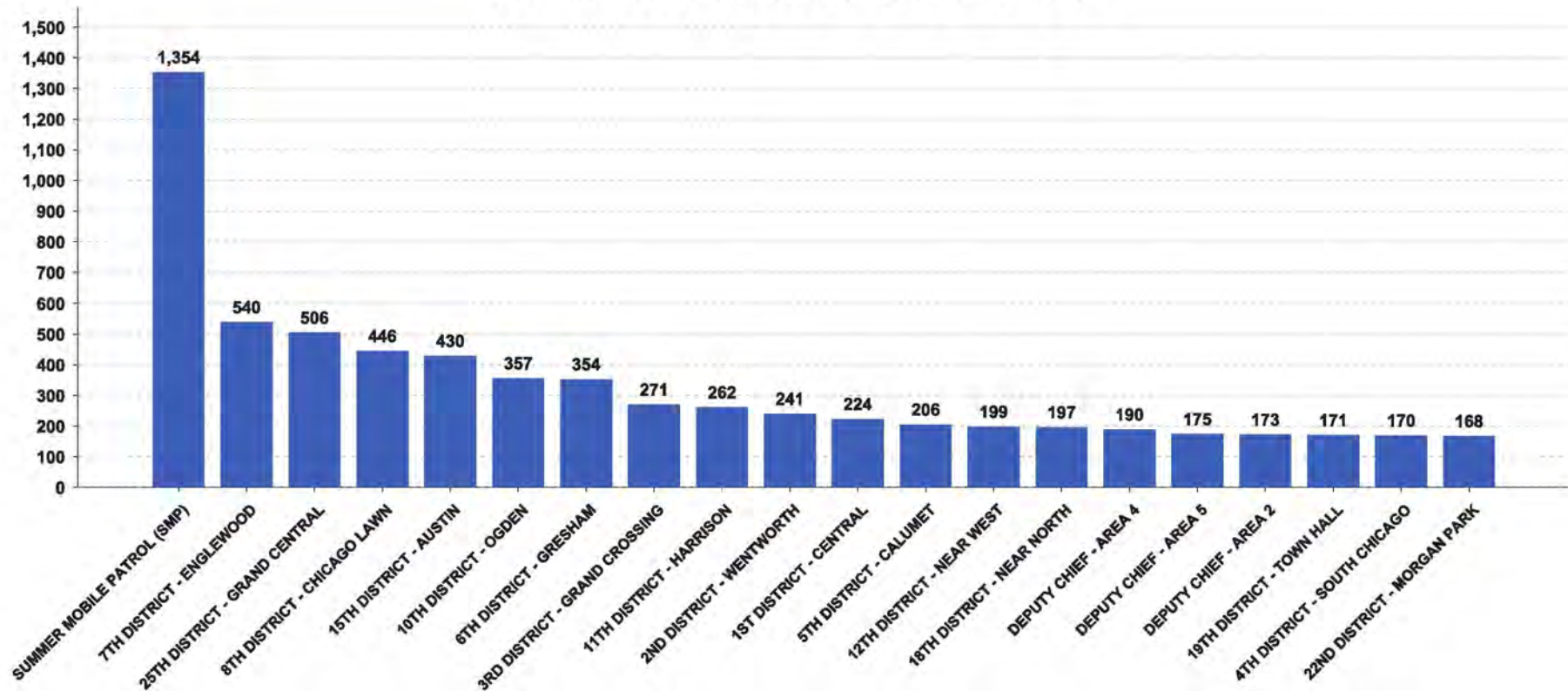

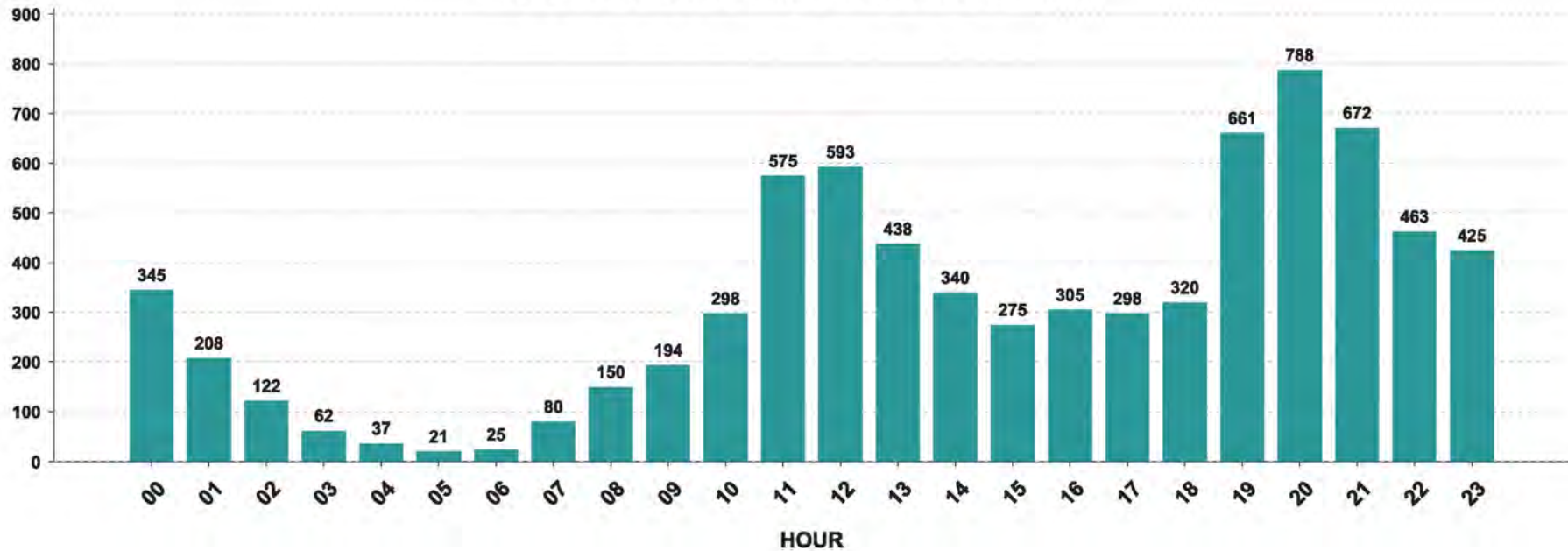

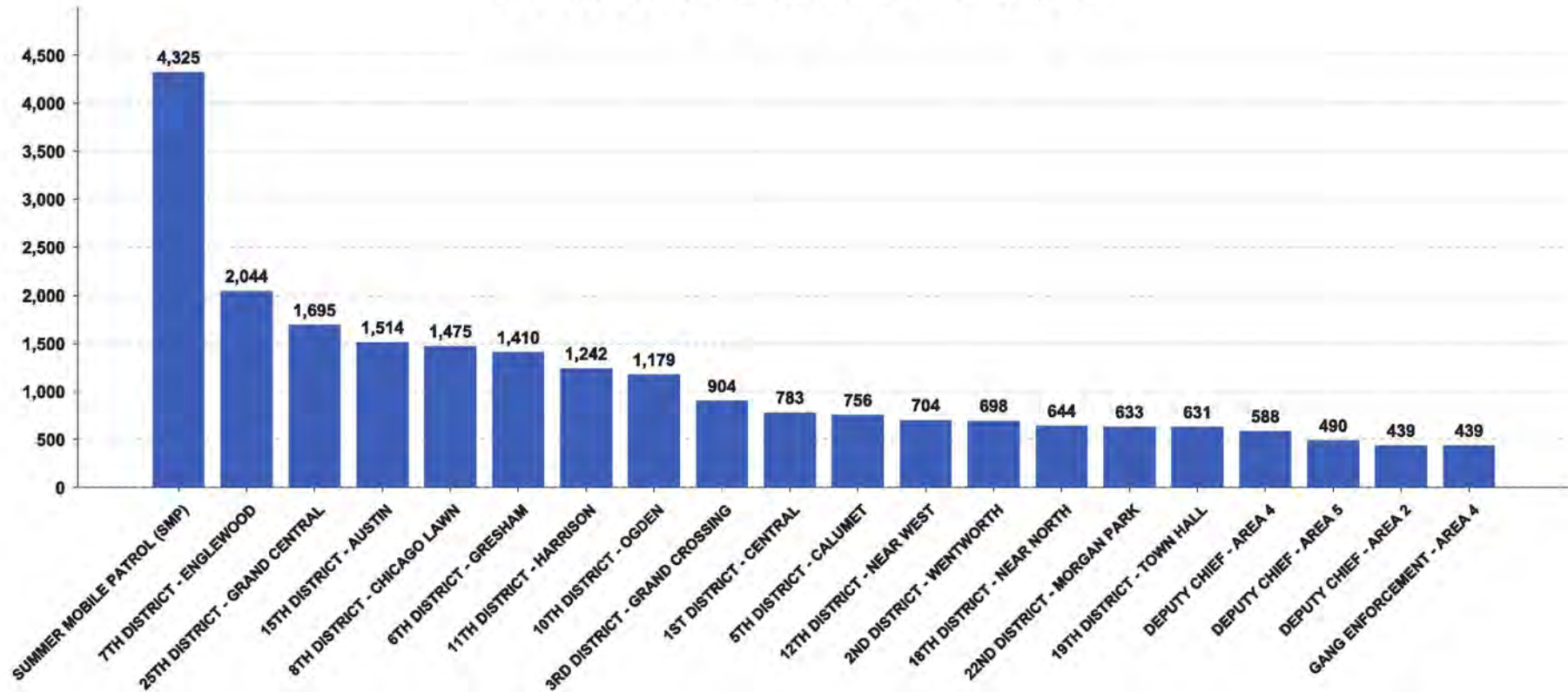

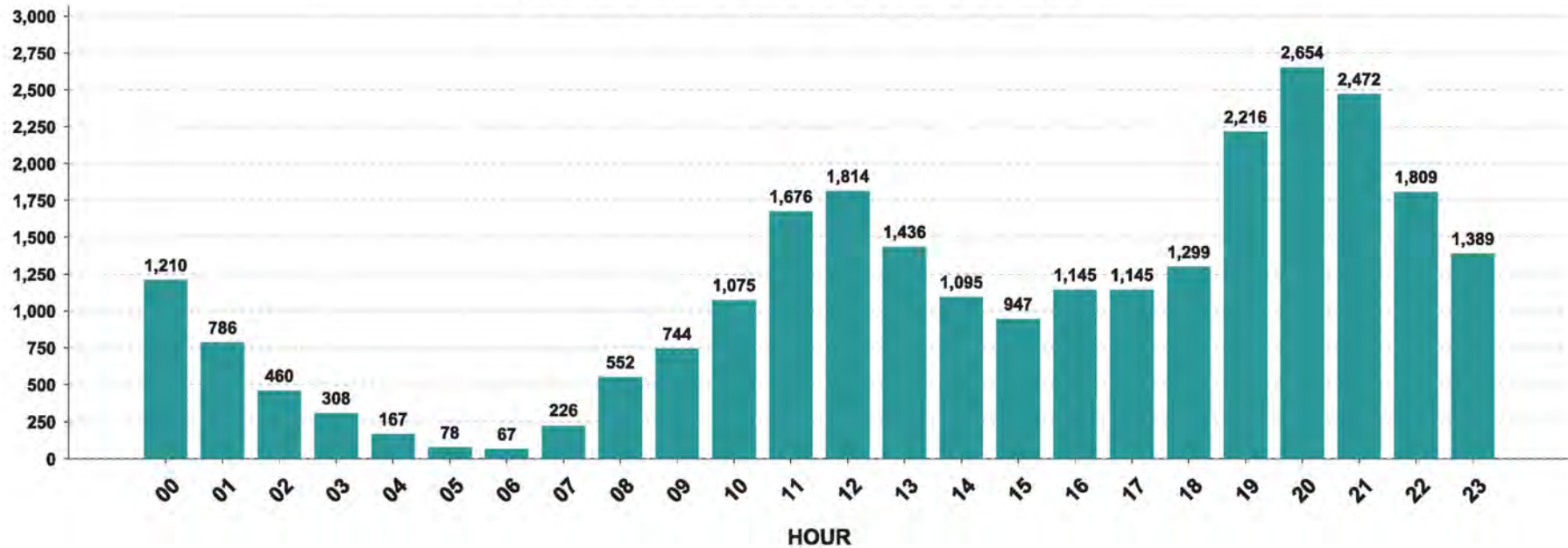

See attached report. I know that manpower is a struggle but we can do better when it comes to traffic stops. We are not covering all of the fixed post that were required during the summer months. I've asked each WOL to assign cars to traffic missions and have those cars submit the activity to the "WOL" prior to the end of their tour for review and discussion (with the assigned officers). When the missions are conducted I've heard sergeants request that the cars bring the activity in to the watch secretary. That's not what my request was. We need to address this issue and correct immediately. This will be placed squarely on the WOL to show an increase in our traffic related enforcement on your watch. Again, this is not about numbers it's a strategy to address shootings and robberies. The Captain and I will be meeting with the WOL's within the next week to discuss your strategies. The strategies should just be one car assigned to the mission.

Tact should be leading the district in stops with the watches closely behind. 011 has the most violence and should be leading the city (Districts) in stops.

"They are making the stops but not recording them" is not a valid reason.

Capt McKenzie see me about this matter today.

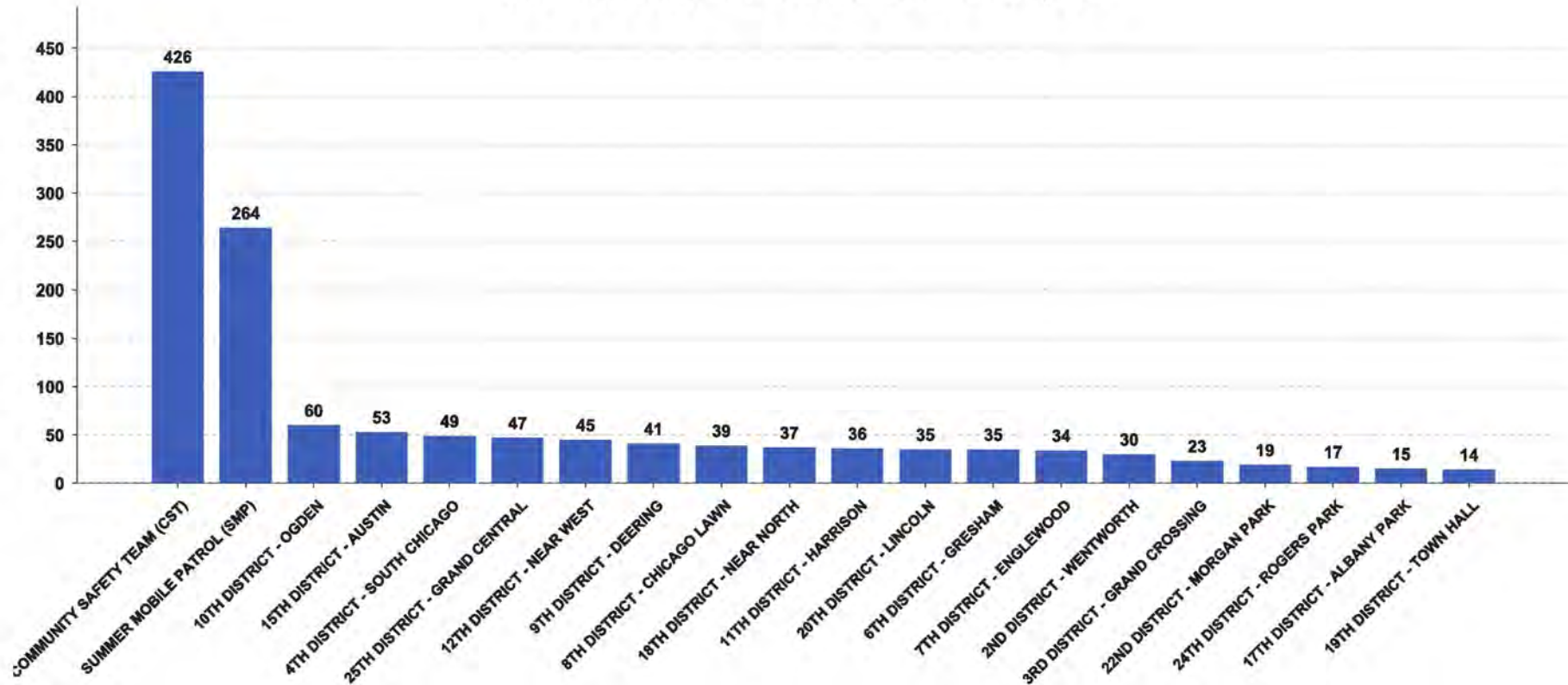

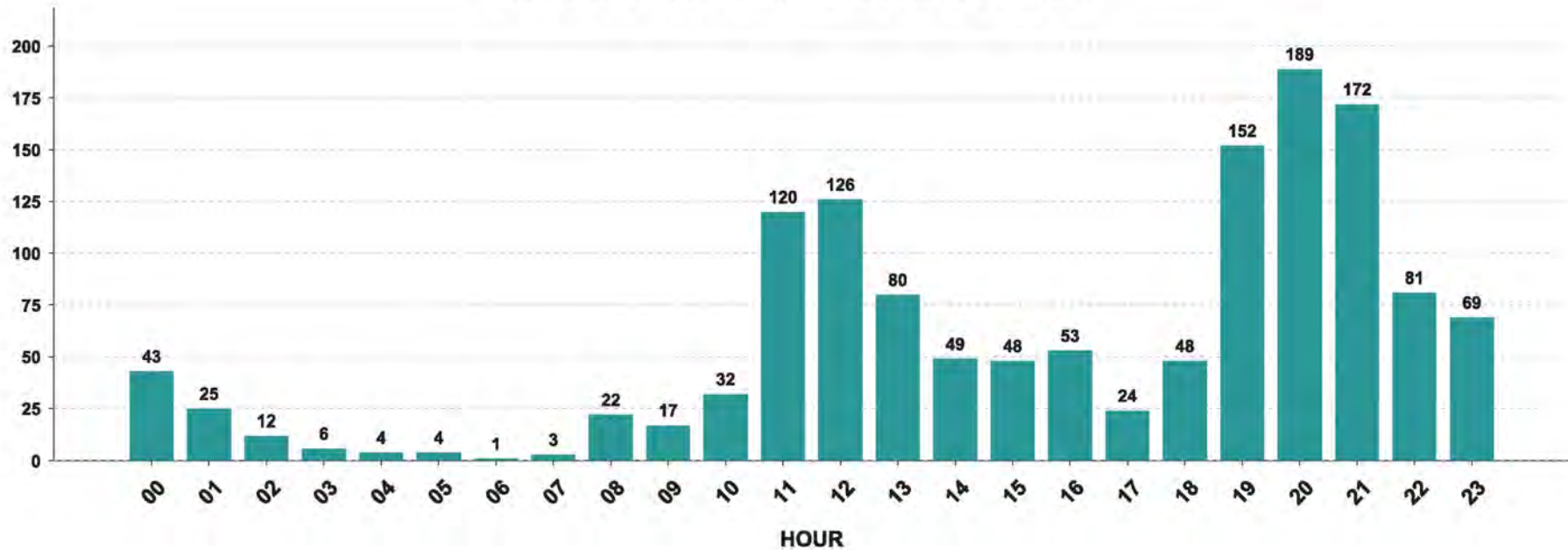

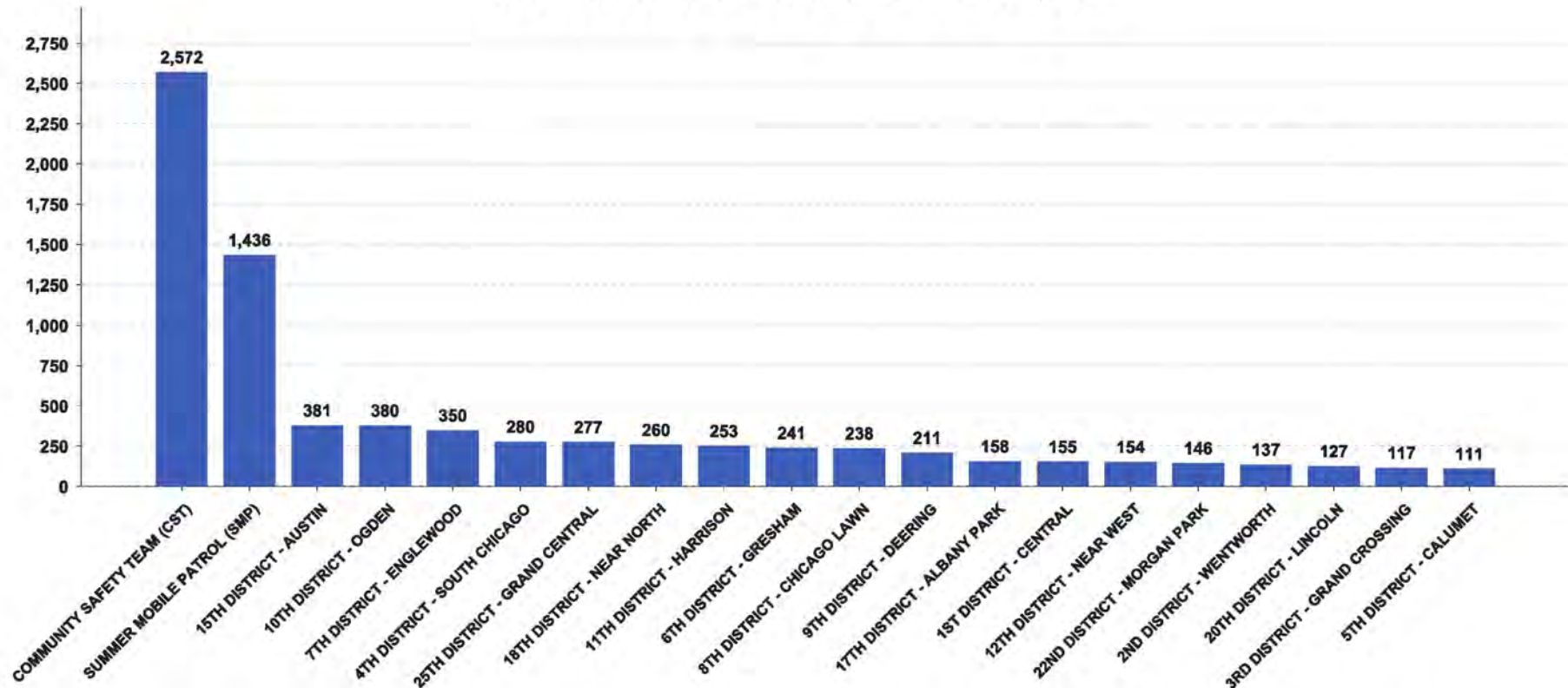

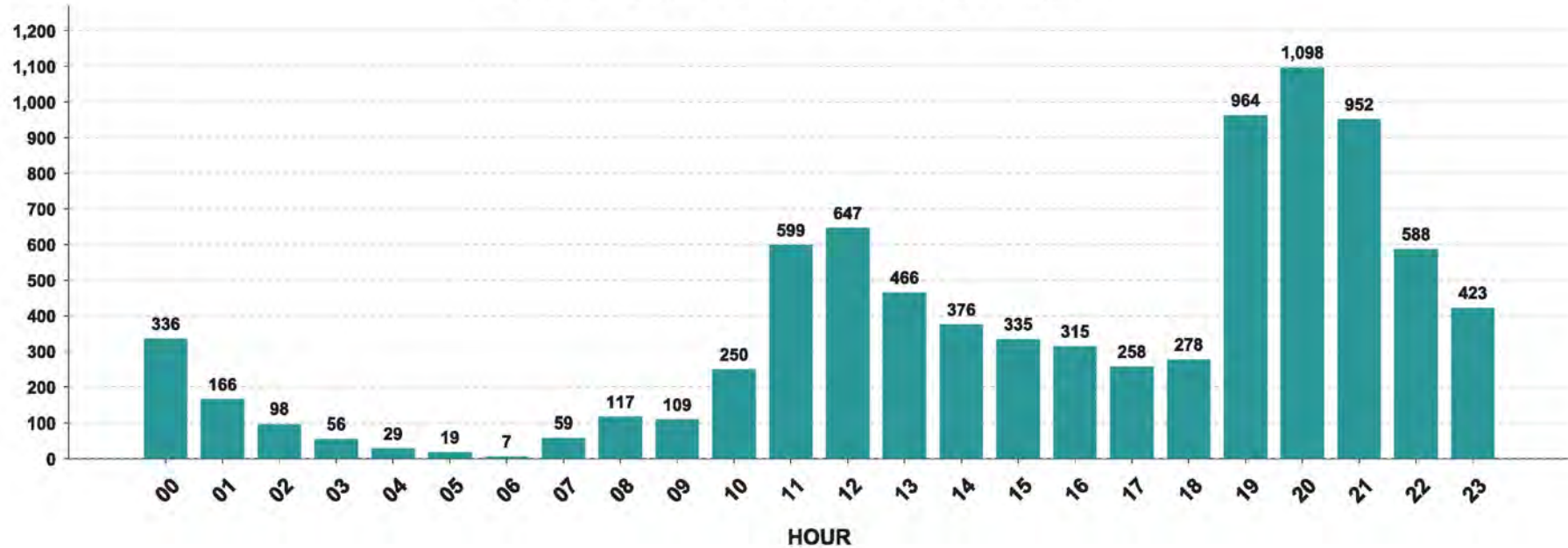

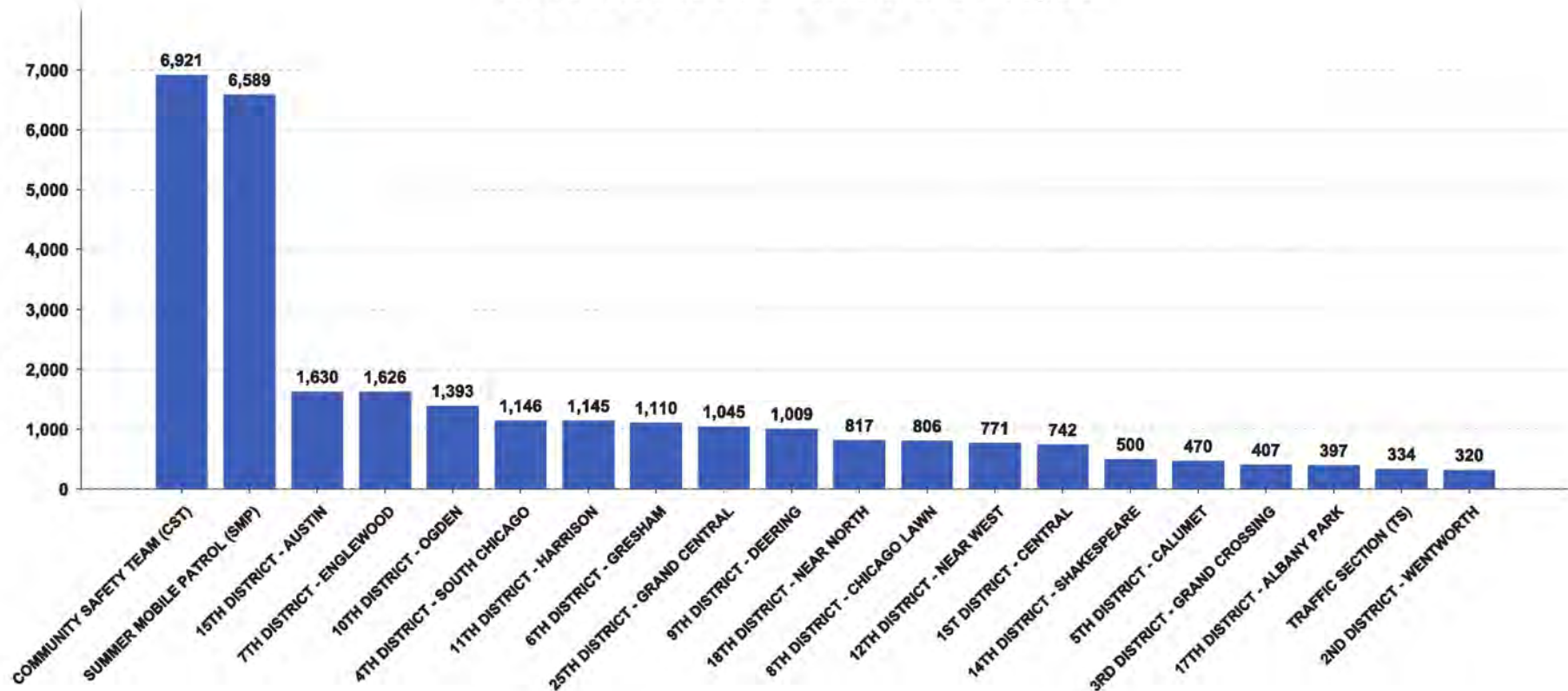

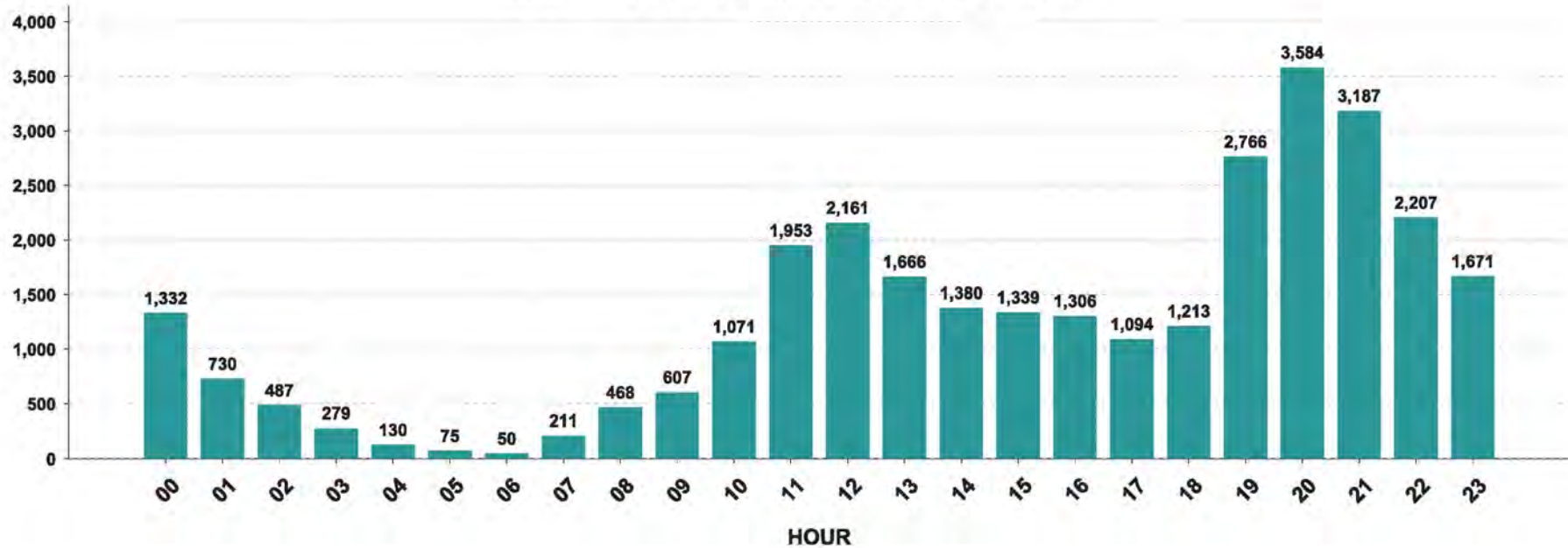

Chicago police leadership places many tactical officers back in patrol cars amid struggle to contain violence

Chicago police Superintendent David Brown has moved more than half the department's officers assigned to tactical units to basic patrol functions as the department struggles with an exodus of cops due to retirements and others out sick with coronavirus, and as it deals with some who have shown poor performance, law enforcement sources said over the weekend.

The officers being reassigned are from tactical units — which typically make the most arrests in the department's 22 patrol districts and focus on crime patterns behind robberies, shootings and drug activity — to the regular district patrols whose cops respond to 911 calls and establish more of a rapport with businesses and residents.

The change comes as 2021 ended as one of Chicago's most violent years in decades. Some 800 people were slain, 4,000 were shot and more than 1,700 carjackings were reported, police statistics show.

Brown has chosen to move tactical officers to beat patrol functions for several reasons, sources said, including that a big swath of the department has been sidelined with COVID-19 and the nation's second largest police force has been losing officers to retirements.

Around the time Brown's permanent predecessor, Eddie Johnson, was fired by Mayor Lori Lightfoot in late 2019, the department had around 13,000 sworn officers. Now that number is under 12,000.

One source briefed on the matter through the chain of command said the department learned last week of at least 70 tactical officers across the city who had been showing little or no activity during their shifts.

The issue of generating activity, however, has proven controversial for Brown. He’s been known to push his commanders to get their officers to make more arrests and traffic stops. At weekly CompStat meetings, in which Brown evaluates the performance of his command staff, he has indicated that he would demote commanders for poor performance.

But police oversight advocates, including the American Civil Liberties Union of Illinois, have warned that this demand for activity could lead to wholesale constitutional violations, particularly in Black and brown communities, in what amounts to a police quota system.

A Chicago police supervisor, Lt. Franklin Paz, filed a lawsuit against the department last year, alleging he was removed from his unit because he was pressured to make illegal stops and arrests. That lawsuit is pending.

Brown and Lightfoot have often blamed what they perceive as a lenient, catch-and-release criminal justice system in Cook County for the rise in Chicago’s violence.

Lightfoot, as well as Gov. J.B. Pritzker, have pledged to spend hundreds of millions of dollars on community-based violence prevention groups that focus on conflict mediation and provide social services to address mental illness and other other root causes of violence. Proponents of this method see it as a more viable alternative to spending a big chunk of the city of Chicago’s budget each year on policing.

UPDATE: Lightfoot strongly backs top cop David Brown despite police supervisors' lack of confidence in his leadership

Following a brutal year of violence and a not-so-veiled threat to demote his top brass, Chicago Police Supt. David Brown now faces a crisis of confidence among his command staff, sources said.

Four police supervisors all raised concerns in interviews with the Chicago Sun-Times that Brown isn't fit to serve as the city's top cop during a particularly tumultuous period for the police department. They all commented on the condition of anonymity so they could speak freely.

“His strategies and his efforts [and] the threatening of command staff shows a lack of leadership,” one source said. “I can’t think of one member of the command staff that is willing to back him.”

Brown was handpicked by Mayor Lori Lightfoot and confirmed by the City Council in April 2020, three months after the first case of COVID-19 was detected in Chicago and just over a month before riots broke out across the city following the police killing of George Floyd. Throughout his tenure, violent crime has continued to surge. **Chicago last year saw the most homicides in a quarter-century**, 836 by the Cook County medical examiner’s count.

As the department sought to recalibrate during a closed-door meeting on Jan. 4, **Brown and Lightfoot effectively threatened to demote members of the police command staff** if they couldn’t produce more arrests and community outreach, warning that underperforming tactical officers could be moved to patrol streets and answer 911 calls.

Within days, **district commanders were told that 60% of their tactical officers were being moved to beat cars** without a clear explanation, sources said. **When Brown later blamed the recent uptick in COVID-19 cases during a meeting**, police sources continued to question his motive for the move, which prompted members of the tactical unit for the Grand Central District to quit that team en masse.

One police source recalled speaking to nine other high-ranking police officials amid concerns that cutting tactical units — which are responsible for proactive policing, including responding to gunfire and gang disturbances and conducting surveillance — could result in more crime and violence.

“We all agreed Brown was driving CPD into the ground. Zero confidence in his ability to lead the department,” said the source, who predicted there could be more than 1,000 citywide homicides this year if Brown stays in power.

A police spokesman declined Tuesday to comment on the supervisors’ remarks. But

Brown said at the news conference with Lightfoot earlier this month that he remains focused on the building community trust and reforming the department.

“We are striving for a safer Chicago and a more transparent Chicago Police Department, a transformed department with a changed culture,” he said.

Managing a depleted police force struggling from low morale, Brown had focused on building specialized citywide units, plucking officers from district assignments and shirking the community-based strategy of his predecessor Charlie Beck.

Brown perhaps most notably created the Community Safety Team, whose mission was to both fight crime and have positive interactions with people in communities with high rates of violence. But in November, he gutted the unit, which once had about 875 officers and now has fewer than 240, according to data kept by the city’s inspector general.

One source said shifting officers has been part of the problem.

“The department has been in a constant state of reorganization since Brown arrived, which is evidence that he has no strategy and doesn’t know what he’s doing,” the source said.

Brown detailed plans earlier this month to assign more than 200 more cops to the detective division. In addition, he said he wants officers this year to make 1.5 million positive community interactions to bolster trust — a three-fold increase from last year.

An internal police document obtained by the Sun-Times shows each district has a specific goal to meet, with a total amounting to 1 million interactions. The department’s other bureaus are expected to handle the other 500,000 interactions, one source said.

The source raised alarms that increasing the number of positive community interactions could devolve into “a new version of stop-and-frisk,” a concern echoed by

the ACLU of Illinois.

“Numeric quotas tend to be the kinds of things that as a general proposition lead to racial profiling and an inordinate number of stops for one group of people,” ACLU spokesman Ed Yohnka warned.

The criticism comes after Lt. Franklin Paz filed a whistleblower lawsuit last January alleging that his commander on the Community Safety Team demanded certain numbers as it related to police activity.

Meanwhile, sources said Brown has repeatedly compared this year’s police activity to 2019, when there were significantly more arrests than the past two years. One police source said it’s reasonable to conclude that a sort of shadow quota system has been put in place as part of the superintendent’s goals of increasing arrests and community interactions and getting more activity out of tactical officers.

“If numbers matter, then there’s a quota in place,” the source said of the department’s recent efforts.

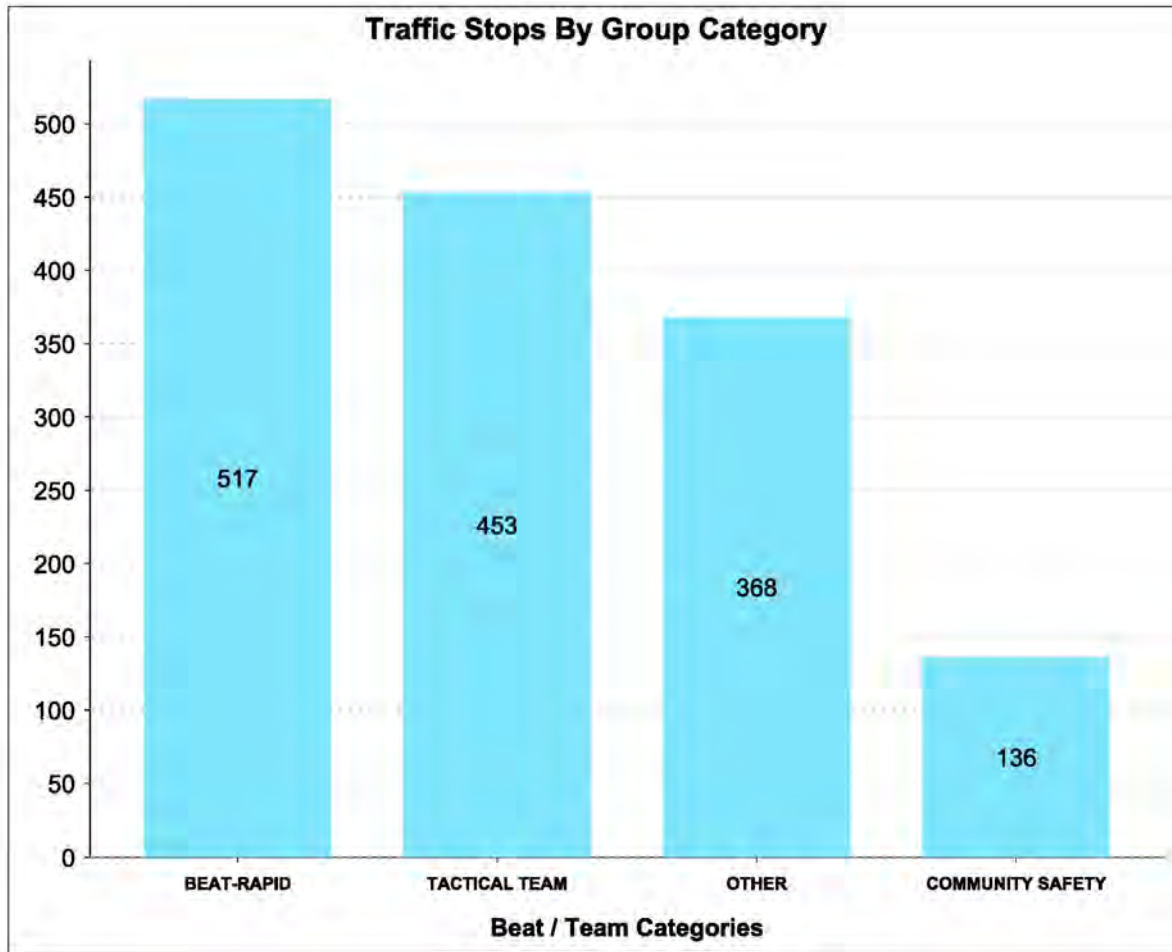

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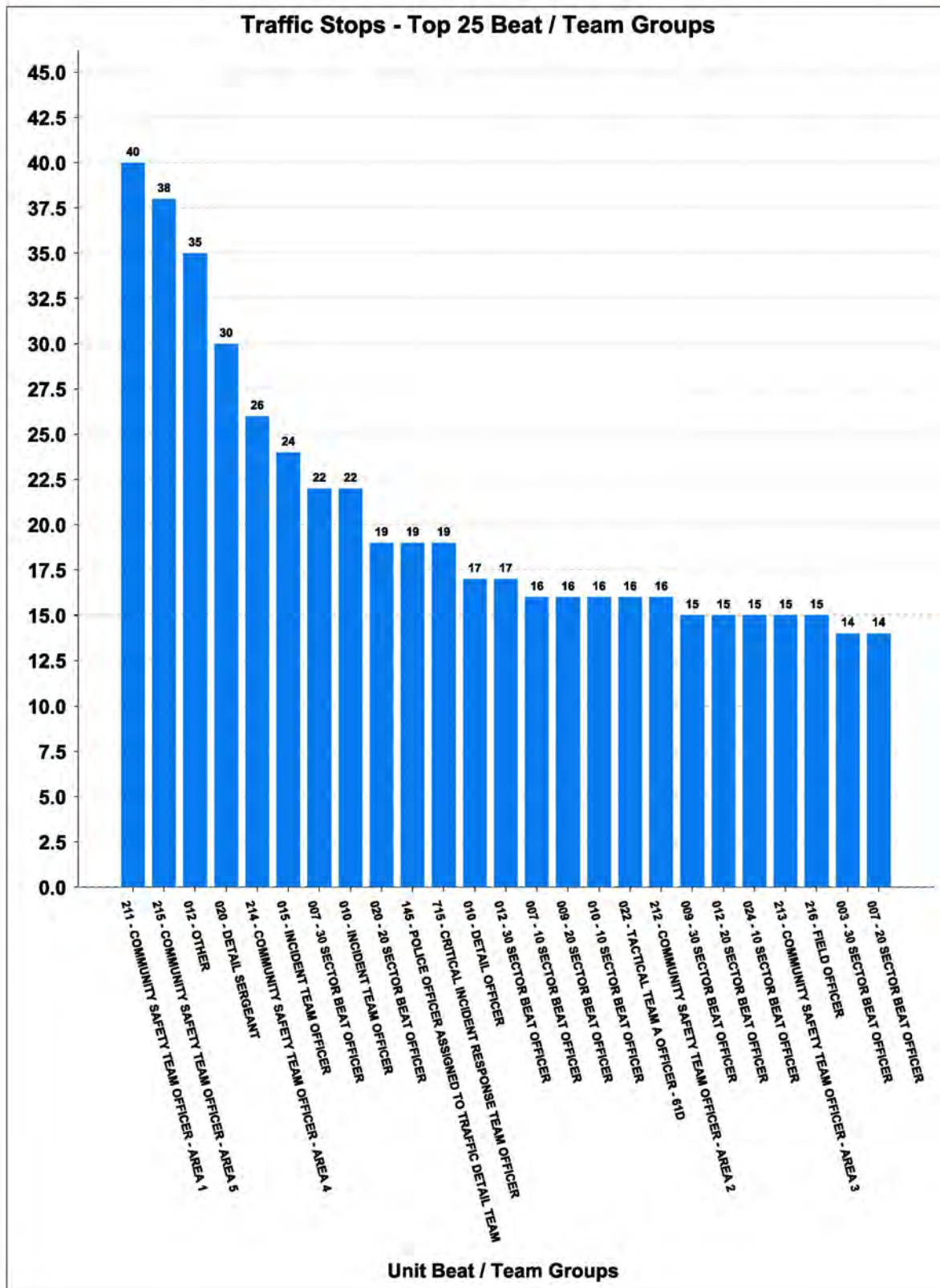

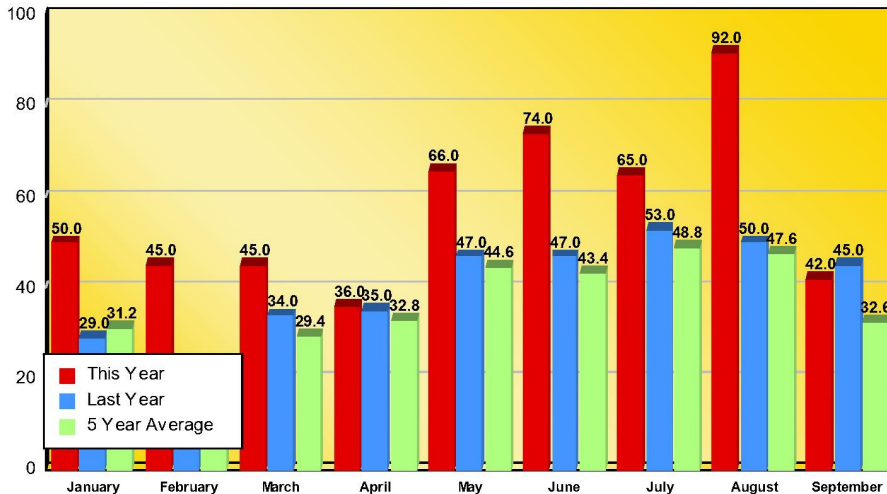

A great example of this is the time that David earned a Life Saving Award. On 22 DEC 08, an OEMC call was broadcast in the 008th District regarding smoke coming from a house at 7243 S. Troy. Officers Karl Richardt and Elliot Flagg, working Beat 832, were first to arrive on scene followed closely by Beat 833, Officers Adam Stark and David Neberieza. The officers immediately observed thick black smoke and flames coming from the single family home and called for assistance. Officer Richardt approached the home and heard children screaming for help inside. Officer Richardt's access to the side of the house was blocked, so he quickly ran to the rear of the home and made his way to a series of windows on the north side of the house. Officer Richardt was able to reach up and force open the window of the bedroom and pull out two children, ages seven and eleven, as the building was being engulfed by smoke and flames. With his rear exit now blocked, Officer Richardt ran to the wrought iron gate and called out to Officer Stark, who was in front of the building. David, even though being assigned to the SDSC Room is always neat in appearance, and when detailed to special events, is always in proper uniform. David understands the concept of appearance demanding respect, and is a great example to his peers.

This is definitely a trait that any good sergeant on our department must have. David is a veteran officer, who possesses a great deal of knowledge about the local gangs, emerging crime patterns and gang related conflicts. David is eager to share his knowledge not only with the members of his team, but also with other officers assigned to 008, or any outside unit that may benefit. David is not in this for personal gain, he is what one would refer to as a team player.

An example of David's great interpersonal skills is how he coordinated efforts with the ATF on a weapons related investigation. While working in Gangs, he had a confidential subject for ammo and cannabis. He informed them about someone on Westside who was attempting to sell multiple guns and a ballistic vest. David and his team coordinated with ATF, and arranged a purchase with the CI and ATF. ATF recorded several phone conversations and text message exchanges between the R/CI and the target who agreed that the CI would purchase several handguns, an AK47 and body armor for an agreed on price at a west side barber shop. On the day of the purchase, the target changed the location and offered additional weapons for an increased price. When both CI's approached to make the purchase 2 offenders produced pistols and announced a robbery. Enforcement responded and one offender was immediately placed in custody with gun recovered, while the other fled and committed a Home Invasion. This offender then hid his gun inside that residence and was placed in custody while attempting to flee the back residence. Both offenders charged Federal with gun offenses, conspiracy to sell firearms. The operation lasted a week and culminated successfully in that it was adjusted on the fly, without a single shot being fired and no injury of any sort.

Commitment/Personal Integrity

David has the ability to act in an honest and fair manner that is consistent with the Department's vision, values, and moral principles. David accepts personal responsibility for his actions, or the outcomes of his actions. David truly understands that he, and he alone, is solely responsible for the outcome of his actions or decisions. Due to his acceptance of the outcomes of his actions and decisions, I

truly believe that he is the perfect candidate for sergeant within our department. David exemplifies what we are looking for in our leadership personnel: someone who is willing to make a decision, and accept the outcome, and take ownership of that decision. David also remains committed to his work, despite the anti-police rhetoric that encompasses him on a daily basis. His body of work to this day is a true testament to this, as he remains one of the top producers of activity in the 008th District. An example of his willingness and continuing work ethic earned him a Traffic Stop of the Month Award in 2014. David and his partner observed the driver of a vehicle fail to use a turn signal and conducted a traffic stop. The driver was unable to produce a driver's license and was placed under arrest. Post arrest, the offender informed the officers that he carried a gun in the glove box of the vehicle to protect himself from being robbed. Officers recovered a Sturm, Ruger and Company .357 caliber revolver loaded with five rounds. During a subsequent name inquiry it was learned that the offender had an active felony warrant out of the state of California for a Forcible Rape. The subject was previously convicted of Rape in California and fled the state to avoid incarceration. The subject was charged locally with UUW by a convicted felon, and would eventually be extradited to California. While at the Probable Cause hearing for the weapon charge, P.O. Neberieza learned from the Cook County ASA that the Rape charge the offender was convicted of was a particularly violent incident during which the offender was part of a group of individuals who gang raped the victim and then murdered her. David still believes in the nobility of our profession, and in my opinion would be an asset to our Department, in that he would be able to instill this believe in those who were to be assigned under him.

Community Relations

David treats all persons that he comes into contact with fairly. David maintains the same calm and collect mannerisms in all aspects of his police work. Whether he be on the scene of a protest, a shooting incident, or any other critical incident, David is able to act with tact and diplomacy with all those he come into contact. David has the capability to remain calm, and uninfluenced by a crowd's behavior, and maintain an extremely professional manner in dealing with the crowds, be they either hostile or friendly.

David has not only developed great relationships with his coworkers, he is also respected in the community in which he serves. This is confirmed by the complimentary letter that he has received from members of the community, detailing instances where David has gone above and beyond the call of duty to serve their needs. It is also evident in the way that I've seen him interact with members of the community as well. David presents the positive, professional image that the Chicago Police Department wants to show the world.

David has the ability to remain calm and in control, even during crisis situations. It's David's cool demeanor that helps his fellow officers remain in a controlled state, by following the example that he displays on a continual basis. The very nature of the body of work in the

gang units that David performed on a daily basis while assigned there, put his tolerance to the test. A true indicator of David's ability to handle stressful situations successfully would be the fact that he has only had to file twenty TRR's during his tenure with the Department. This is quite an accomplishment since the very nature of his work in his previous units was dealing with high profile, and often violent, gang members. David also has the ability to de-escalate tense situations in the field. This has been displayed by his demeanor during recent protests, as well as his ability to calm hostile crowds down at shooting scenes, and his ability to elicit valuable information from them during these tense times.

Other

David is a very approachable, down to earth type of person. David knows how to be the police; he has worked in the 008th District, Gang Enforcement, and Area Midnight Mission Teams, all of which are very busy and prestigious assignments. He has been an aggressive officer for his entire career, and has pushed himself to be the best officer that he can. David is fair and impartial towards everyone he comes in contact with, this is a trait that is extremely important for any supervisor to possess. In my opinion, David Neberieza is what the Department is seeking in its supervisors. David would be the type of supervisor that would lead by example, instead of preaching from the grandstands.

Jeffery Havelka is the type of person that the Chicago Police Department is looking for in its sergeants. Jeff has worked his entire career in the 008th District, and is the type of worker that needs little if any supervision, as he is a self-motivated worker and efficient at what he does. With the new Anti-Violence Initiatives and Gang Strategies that the Department is embarking upon, Jeffery Havelka is the type of sergeant that would prove essential in ensuring that these endeavors were successful.

Jeffery Havelka has the integrity, tenacity, and leadership skills needed to direct our officers in completing the mission of the Department. Jeff has exposed himself to have the skill set needed to coach and mentor officers, and use sound judgment when making important decisions, and the persistence and proper judgment needed to conduct thorough and logical investigations. Jeff has also shown the personal initiative needed to be a leader in our department, by taking that extra step to gain more knowledge about crime trends and gang conflicts in his area, and not being satisfied with a half effort in a preliminary investigation. It is in the opinion of this nominator, that Jeffery Havelka's expertise and skillset would make him a logical choice, for sergeant of police.

Dear Atticus Ballesteros:

On behalf of the Chicago Police Department (CPD) this letter is a Supplementary response to your Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") request of September 27, 2022. After CPD's response on October 25, 2022, you sent the message below on October 26, 2022 seeking follow-up information:

The record produced yesterday concerns CPD's analysis of the 15 most violent beats for a certain time period. I noticed that the part of our FOIA request concerning that analysis was copied into your letter dated yesterday. However, our original FOIA request (attached) also referenced other analyses by CPD, as well (see Section 2 of the attached FOIA). That part of the FOIA request was not copied into your letter dated yesterday and the record produced yesterday is not responsive to that part of the request. In addition to what was produced yesterday, we are seeking records of CPD's analysis of the 55 most violent beats as referenced by Superintendent Brown in various public statements this year.

Another search for data and documents related to Section 2 of your request yielded positive results for the two attached records, including; 1) a list of the 55 most violent Beats as of January 25, 2022, and 2) the print out of a two-part tool created to perform analysis on data for the 55 most violent Beats.

Be advised that crime data by Beat is also available online at <https://data.cityofchicago.org/>. Click on the blue tab labeled "Public Safety" and then click the tab labeled "Crimes – 2001 to present – Dashboard" or use this shortcut: <https://data.cityofchicago.org/Public-Safety/Crimes-2001-to-present-Dashboard/5cd6-ry5g>. You can also submit a FOIA request for specific data making sure to include a date range and the desired data points.

To the extent you consider this a denial you have the right to a review under 5 ILCS 140-9.5(a) by the Public Access Counselor (PAC) at the Office of the Illinois Attorney General, 500 South Second Street, Springfield, Illinois 62706, Phone: (877) 299-3642, Fax: 217-782-1396, E-mail: public.access@ilag.org. You may also seek judicial review of a denial under 5 ILCS 140/11 by filing a lawsuit in the Cook County Circuit Court.
