Increasing Educational Opportunities for People with Criminal Records

## **THE PROBLEM:** People with criminal records are being deterred from getting an education.

- The majority of colleges ask about an applicant's criminal record. But, asking this question has a chilling effect – discouraging individuals with criminal records from completing the application.
- With about 45% of Illinois adults having a criminal record, it is critical that we address this barrier to education.
- As of the Fall of 2018, the common application no longer asks about an applicant's criminal record.

THE SOLUTION: "Ban the box" in the higher education admissions process.

Evidence shows that
asking about a
criminal record at
admission does
nothing to protect
public safety, but
seeing the "box" on
school applications
prevents individuals
from trying to apply
to higher education.

- Banning the box prevents higher education institutions from asking about or considering a person's criminal record for purposes of admission.
- Banning the box <u>does not prohibit</u> a college or university to consider a person's criminal record *after* admission, including for offering campus housing, participating in campus activities, or to provide career counseling.

Higher education dramatically reduces recidivism and helps individuals build financially stable futures.
