SUPPORT HB 3447: REDUCING BARRIERS TO RECOVERY

- Reclassifies the penalty for small-scale drug possession from a felony to a Class A misdemeanor.
- Offers real diversion in the form of behavioral health assessments and access to treatment for people who need it, rather than incarceration.
- Creates pathways for people living with felony convictions for drug possession to expunge their records.

HB 3447 (Ammons/Bush) would strengthen Illinois communities by elevating a public health approach to reducing the harms associated with drug use, replacing the failed strategy of punishment and incarceration:

Enables people arrested for possessing drugs to continue living and working in their communities, while connecting them to services they may need – adding to the economic vitality of neighborhoods across Illinois.

Prosecuting drug possession as a felony has resulted in tens of thousands of people from Waukegan to Cairo being limited in opportunities for employment, housing, and education. Our communities are stronger when everyone can participate.

Addresses racial inequities in our criminal legal system.

While drug use is a reality in all communities, people of color—especially Black Illinoisans--are far more likely to be arrested, convicted, and incarcerated for possessing drugs. The result is that neighborhoods of color have been adversely impacted, with so many residents experiencing incarceration or the stigma of living with a felony record.

Shifts resources away from the failed strategy of arrest and incarceration and refocuses our resources on Illinoisans' real priorities.

If we reclassify low-level drug possession as a misdemeanor and utilize public health resources, we can allow our criminal legal system to focus on reducing the violence that remains too high across Illinois, and free up resources currently wasted on imprisonment to help people access health services in the communities where they live.
