STOP THE CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT'S DEADLY FOOT CHASES

A **Foot Pursuit** is an inherently dangerous situation where an officer physically chases an individual on foot.

Chicago has a long history of foot pursuits leading to police shooting and killing Black and brown Chicagoans.

- > This year, police killed 13-year-old Adam Toledo & 22-year-old Anthony Alvarez in foot chases.
- From March-Dec 2020, police used deadly force in 30 foot chases.
 - The percentage of foot chases involving deadly force more than doubled from the previous period.
- A 2016 study shows that from 2010–2015, <u>Black people</u> were the target of 94% of CPD foot pursuits.

In May 2021, CPD Released an Interim Foot Pursuit Policy that Endangers Communities.

- It DOES NOT state that foot pursuits carry a **significant risk of danger and even death**.
- It PERMITS foot pursuits for many minor offenses—like possession of alcohol by a minor, obscenity, gambling, possession of drug paraphernalia, and prostitution—that don't threaten safety.
- It is VAGUE and **fails to give clear, easy-to-understand guidance** about when NOT to chase on foot.
- It PERMITS foot chases when a chase is "objectively reasonable" and officers merely have "reasonable suspicion" of an offense—that is less than what is needed for an arrest.
- It FAILS to require officers to document their assessment of the risks and reasons for every foot pursuit even those that do NOT result in a stop or arrest. This prevents review to ensure that chases are justified.
- It was developed WITHOUT input from Black and brown Chicagoans impacted by foot pursuits.

MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD. Before July 15, 2021, submit the following Public Comment to CPD here.

CPD's Interim Foot Pursuit Policy fails to protect Chicago communities from deadly foot pursuits.

(1) The policy must state that foot pursuits carry a **significant and inherent risk of danger and even death**.

(2) The policy **must prohibit foot chases when the person is suspected only of a** <u>minor offense</u>, regardless of whether the offense is labeled a "Class A misdemeanor" or something else.

(3) The policy **must prohibit foot chases in the following circumstances**, unless a person poses an immediate danger to the physical safety of an officer or another person:

- when the fleeing person's identity is established, <u>allowing apprehension later time</u>,
- when the officer can use <u>alternative apprehension strategies</u>, such as surveillance and containment,
- when the pursuing officer is alone,
- when officers pursue multiple people, but do not reasonably believe they can control them,
- when the fleeing person enters a building/isolated area or limited visibility makes pursuit dangerous, or
- when the officer loses visual contact of the person.

(4) The policy must state that the **immediate apprehension of a person is** <u>rarely</u> more important than the safety of the person, members of the public, and CPD officers.

(5) The policy **must require documentation of** every foot chase—regardless of outcome—in a report addressing:

- the officer's reason for starting the foot chase and assessment of the risks involved,
- a description of available alternative approaches the officer chose not to take,
- the course and approximate distance of the pursuit, and
- any injuries or medical treatment required.

(6) The policy must require supervisors to review all reports and body camera videos from every foot chase.

(7) Violations of the foot pursuit policy **must result in appropriate corrective action**, including discipline.
